The European Commission has exclusive competence to propose new laws

Public Consultations

- Are used to justify the regulatory proposals prepared by the European Commission
- 2. Are part of the regulatory process
- Aim to collect data and views of stakeholders and citizens
- 4. Are structured and follow certain standard procedures
- Are conducted online

You should participate in the public consultation

What does it matter to you?

There are several reasons why you should dedicate time and resources to participate in public consultations.

Why?

- 1. Aid the European Commission to understand the areas the EU is meant to regulate
- 2. Excellent opportunity to provide input in an earlyphase of law-making
- 3. Submissions are registered and used as future reference for institutions, other interested parties and your own organisation
- 4. You are acknowledged as an interested stakeholder





Two phases of a public consultation

PHAS E	NAME	CONTENT	SHOULD YOU ENGAGE?	WHY?
1	Call for evidence	 Describes the problem to be tackled Identifies the objectives Explains why EU action is needed Outlines policy options Describes the main features of the consultation strategy, i.e. Public consultation with questionnaire Includes roadmap with key milestones of the proposal 	YES	 Freedom of content Acknowledgement as interested stakeholder
2	Online Consultations	 List of specific questions, often in the form of multiple choices Possibility to submit a position paper Cover all areas of competence of the European union, from fisheries to banking Normally open for 12 weeks. Shorter periods can be foreseen in case of urgency 	YES	 Feedback to specific questions from the European Commission Feedback in any EU language Possibility to provide a position paper

Unlike the public consultations, these are often restricted and upon-invitation only. You must therefore engage effectively with the European Commission to be part of these activities.

In parallel to the open public consultations, the European Commission can:

- 1. Organise Hearings
- 2. Host Workshops
- 3. Create Expert Groups
- 4. Have One-on-one consultations
- 5. Appoint external consultant

WHAT HAPPENS AFTER YOUR SUBMISSION?



PHASE	NAME	CONTENT
1	European Commission	 Will gather and assess the information provided by stakeholders Will draft a proposal Will conduct an Impact Analysis – Assessment of the impact of the proposal on economic operators and society, including the impact on SMEs
2	Regulatory Scrutiny Board	 Will screen the draft proposal and the Impact Analysis Will approve or reject the proposal In case of rejection, the European Commission will need to improve the proposal according to the recommendations received
3	European Commission	If the proposal passes the previous step, the European Commission will formally approve the proposal
4	European Parliament & Council	Assessment and adoption of the proposal





Important tips

- 1. Keep your submission short and concise
- 2. Always include an executive summary
- 3. Use positive engagement
- 4. Propose solutions
- 5. Provide data and figures
- 6. Give yourself time to prepare your submission
